Here are a few of our current programs:

Membership Master: when you find someone to join your club, make sure to put your member number in the sponsor section of their application! We are rewarding people for bringing in new members! Find details here.

Bragging Rights: Clubs that sign up the most members in a given month are listed on our Facebook page, and the clubs named are entered into a drawing for an end of year Toastmasters gift card! More information on that program is here.

Talk up Toastmasters: This program is run by Toastmasters International, and if you sign up 5 new members in February and March, Toastmasters awards you with a ribbon and 10% off at the Toastmasters store. The district is also adding cash incentives for this program. Check out the flier here.

Dues incentive: By collecting 80% of your club dues by March 15th, your club will be given a \$50 Toastmasters International gift card! The flier for this program is here.

Club Coaches: If your club is struggling for members, we can assign a Club Coach to help you out, bringing fresh ideas and energy to your club! Please have your club president send an email to clubassist@aztoastmasters.org to begin this process.

Club Eagles: If you have over 12 members but still need help getting up to charter strength, there is a program to help you get there. Club Eagles are DTMs with the experience to help you grow. Write eagles@aztoastmasters.org for assistance.

EDDIE A. DAVIS:

HPortrait of Leadership

When you meet Eddie A. Davis, it is clear you are meeting a man with boundless energy, enthusiasm, positivity and focus. Among the myriad more adjectives one might use to describe Eddie is perhaps most important. He is the very definition of leadership.

He means business, but he's fun

Mr. Davis grew up in the Philadelphia area and put himself through college at the age of 22. Arizona State University was his school choice and he went on to earn a Bachelor of Science in Supply Chain Management in 1999. He loved ASU after his first visit, and says college let him see an entirely different side of himself. Always goal-oriented, Eddie describes his college days in this way: "I was the ultimate business mullet: Business in the front, party in the back." The description fits. Eddie is an organized professional with a fun-loving side.

His Toastmasters journey begins

Eddie became interested in public speaking and leadership in 2011 after he gave a presentation to the Navajo Nation about how to do business with Arizona Public Service Company (APS), the electric utility company for which he presently serves as Supply Chain Data Analyst. Eddie was given 20 minutes on the agenda. An hour later, he was asked to exit the stage. That was a Wednesday. Eddie attended his first

Toastmasters meeting the very next day.

less, not more," Eddie admits. Toastmasters is known for its adherence to an agenda, starting on time and stopping on time. And those were the skillsets he was seeking.

And he's been nonstop ever since. At present, Eddie is Administration Manager for District 3, a member of Rise and Shine Toastmasters in Mesa; a member of Elite Toastmasters in Phoenix; and a member of Reddys Toastmasters in Phoenix (one of three corporate clubs at APS). Two of those clubs meet in the 7 a.m. hour. Eddie is indeed a morning person.

He was hesitant at first, however. "For the first six weeks, I have to admit, I was pretty timid; I was looking to learn at the feet of the masters." Eddie quickly discovered the networking opportunities an organization like Toastmasters offered. It truly was a world outside his own.

Eddie first stepped into leadership when he hosted a contest at APS and the very next week, Eddie was invited to be timer at another contest in the Boy Scouts of America building. Eddie loves contests. "They give people a chance to show their growth, and it's typically a very positive experience for everyone, whether they win or not. And it is a chance to meet new people; something I enjoy."

A leader from the beginning

"I joined Toastmasters to learn how to speak Eddie does not hesitate when asked to step up. Within his corporate club, he guickly moved from Sergeant at Arms to Vice President of Membership to President in the space of a year. He swiftly continued his growth becoming Area Director (then Governor) for Saguaro Area 3 in July of 2013, a leadership role for which he would be voted Area Governor of the year. But his growth did not stop there.

> He added more responsibility – and more miles to his car – when he became Zuni Division Governor (now Director). At that time, Zuni Division included many parts of the current Mohave Division. Eddie spent a lot of time on the road traversing Arizona from Lake Havasu to Goodyear, to Kingman, Flagstaff and Quartzsite; places he explained he might never have visited had it not been for taking on the role of Zuni Division Governor for which he would be voted Division Governor of the year. Clearly when Eddie commits to something, he jumps in with both feet.

> He jumps in with his heart, too. Eddie was awarded the Juris Kursulis Sprit Award in the fall of 2015. The award, named for Past District Governor Juris Kursulis, DTM. is bestowed at each District 3 conference and is given to the person who demonstrates unusual enthusiasm, dedication, and caring for District 3 and its members. Eddie proudly

wore the blue denim vest with all its memorabilia, ribbons, pins, and awards until it was bestowed upon Connie Weiss in 2016.

Eddie also received the Art Nieto Club Excellence Award in July of 2017. Established in 2004, the award recognizes an active member dedicated to raising the standard of excellence in District clubs. You may have figured it out by now. Eddie Davis is an example to follow.

About mentorship

When asked about commitment and the power of mentorship, Eddie shared a story about Gloria Diaz from AHCCCS Toastmasters. He invited her to become Division Director, something very much outside the norm as that meant Gloria would skip directly from club officer to Division Director, eliminating the experience of Area Director completely.

"She had a good time; her group was fantastic," Eddie explained. She enjoyed meeting and getting to know everyone but, there were admittedly some rough spots. And Eddie will tell you they they tackled issues together, collectively, with a great group of area directors and lots of support. So, what were the elements of that success? Eddie offers his favorites:

"Not afraid to offer, not afraid to ask" – A leader isn't afraid to offer help or ask if there is something he or she could do. And likewise, a mentor should not be afraid to ask for help or offer to do something by themselves and needs to ask when they need help to accomplish a goal.

Trust – You really do have to trust people to tell you what their needs are. Eddie's philosophy is very in sync with the Toastmasters servant-leadership philosophy. "It's not important for the person to be acknowledged or the center of attention as far as providing leadership or helping someone to achieve their goals. A leader wants the person to be successful."

Mentoring – A strong foundation in Toastmasters has been a very important part of Eddie's growth. He invited Nancy Biggs, his very first mentee, to attend his Distinguished Toastmasters ceremony. Nancy taught Eddie a lot about being a good mentor. Specifically, that it really is not important to know everything, and to teach your mentee everything there is to know. Rather, it's only important to stay one step ahead of them. Otherwise, they may feel disillusioned and overwhelmed. Too much information can be too much. A mentor needs to break it down.

Servant leadership and a solid mentoring philosophy are Eddie's two key principles of leadership along with doing what serves a mentee best, and that is simply staying one step ahead of them. Everything Eddie has done in Toastmasters has been about those key principles. Put simply: "Tell me what you need and how can I help?"

Thoughts on 'lead versus follow'

Eddie understands many come to Toastmasters with real issues when it comes to expressing their communication and leadership skills. He appreciates the hard work it takes to achieve success, but what Eddie finds troubling is "when people feel it's their way or the highway, when that is not the Toastmasters philosophy. Our mission as Toastmasters is to "allow members to fail and provide constructive feedback."

Others do not have to do it exactly the way someone else did. "Everyone has their own voice... their own life experiences they brought to Toastmasters, and everyone has their own needs. Unfortunately, I've seen just one too many people punish others for not being perfect and that is not what Toastmasters is about. To me it's about continuous improvement and not ultimate perfection."

Personal growth

Eddie's leadership opportunities in Toastmasters have been plentiful and have helped him grow professionally and personally. Eddie encourages you to push yourself a little bit. "If you've just joined Toastmasters, look around the room and identify that person whose leadership role you might want someday, and then do what you need to do in order to prepare for that."

"Once you've found success as a club officer, build on that success, build on your network, build on your personal desires and consider moving outside your club to expand your leadership skillset even more as an Area Director, district leader or committee chair."

In closing, Eddie says: "Just like the Highlander, there can only be one, so there can only be one Division Director, but everyone's contribution is important. In Toastmasters, everyone's small contribution makes for the betterment of us all."

CARPE DIEM DON RATLIFF: ACB, CL



Carpe Diem is Latin for Seize the Day!

It's also the name of a President's Distinguished Toastmasters Club whose members are inmates at the Saguaro Correctional Center, in Elov, Arizona.

That's right... a Toastmaster club that meets inside a prison.

I had no idea prison clubs even existed until Kristin Gramando told me about Carpe Diem at the Spring Conference, in 2015. (She is one of four Toastmaster volunteers who regularly work with the club).

As she was telling me about the Carpe Diem, what captured my attention was that since its inception in 2010, over 200+ men had taken part, been released, and to date, not a single one of those 200+ men has gone back to prison!

Prison recidivism rates are often 70-80%, so this truly is an amazing statistic!

When she finished telling me about the club, she asked if I would like to visit sometime and without a moment's hesitation, I said I would!

When the big day finally arrived, I met Kristin at the prison, we went through a screening similar to airport security, and we were then escorted inside the prison.

I must admit... I was a bit nervous at first.

But once the men came into the room, I relaxed. Dressed in tan prison uniforms, the men were friendly and genuinely happy to see us. They addressed us as Mr. Ratliff and Ms. Gramando.

Being a first time visitor, I was given the honor of leading them in the Pledge of Allegiance and never before had I said it with as much pride as I did that morning.

Their speeches, evaluations, and table topics answers were positive and upifting.

Towards the end of the meeting, the VPE went to the lectern to fill the functionary roles for next week's meeting and I was floored by what happened next.

He called for a timer... and five hands went up!

He called for an "ah counter"... and five more hands went up!!

And when he called for a grammarian... four hands went up!!!

Stunned by what I just witnessed, Kristin told me it was a common occurrence and when multiple hands went up, they had a lottery system to determine who would get the role.

Joining Carpe Diem is not a given for the inmates; it is a privilege that must be earned.

Prospects must be free of write ups for one year before they can visit the club. They must then visit three times before they can apply for membership. And their behavior must always be exemplary, as a single infraction can cost them their membership.

I am now one of four Toastmaster volunteers who regularly work with the club, and I keep going back because I love what Toastmasters is doing for them and because of what being a part of Carpe Diem is doing for me.

Pathways officially launched in District 3 on December 5 – Hooray!! Kudos to the entire Pathways deployment team of Ambassadors and Guides who made the valiant effort to make in-person visits to 235 clubs across District 3 to conduct the Pathways orientation. But the reality of getting our members to focus on Pathways in the midst of the holiday season, year-end reviews, and New Year's resolutions was, to say the least, a challenge. One that became apparent during the recent TLI club officer training events.

Ambassadors and Guides, there has been a flood of information
about Pathways available to members and club leaders. Perhaps,
too much information. Since January, Ambassadors and Guides
have been hosting Virtual Support Sessions for Base Camp
Managers, but the attendance by club leaders has been minimal.
So why aren't club leaders reaching out for help?

While our Pathways team is hurrying to respond to those types of requests, many answers to member questions are easily found in the tutorials and resources available to everyone inside Base Camp. However, we are also posting answers to any questions we received through the pathways@aztoastmasters.org mailbox on the following D3 Pathways Implementation site: https://d3pathways.org Oh....and if you're trying to find out who your Ambassador & Guide team is, you can find that information posted there too!

So just how do we "step into" Pathways? In the traditional program, we all received a new member orientation kit from Toastmasters. When opened; two manuals, three booklets, and a variety of paper resources came spilling out. There was no step-by-step instruction for the pile in front of us. Rather, a club officer or member mentor took the time to explain what to read now, what to read later, and what to get started on. Pathways is no different other than your 'packet of materials' is online now.

Regardless of which Path a member chooses, every Path starts with the same Level 1 projects: an IceBreaker, a Speech Evaluation, a Research speech, and a Topical speech you give and then re-give incorporating feedback received from the first delivery.
